JUST A THOUGHT...

Our neighbours across the water are en fête this weekend. Queen Elizabeth II became the longest-reigning British monarch on 9th September 2015. On 6th February 2017 she became the first British monarch to celebrate a Sapphire Jubilee, commemorating 65 years on the throne. In 2022, she became the first British monarch to reign for seventy years. Major celebrations for her Platinum Jubilee are about to begin. She is, by any yardstick, an extraordinary woman. And her subjects have every right to celebrate her.

Queen Elizabeth made a significant contribution to the Peace Process through her visit here. She visited the Republic of Ireland in May 2011. It was the first visit by a reigning British monarch to the Republic. It was seen as a symbolic normalisation of relations between the two countries

following the signing of the 1998 Good Friday Agreement. During the visit, the Queen visited sites of significance for Irish nationalism, such as the Garden of Remembrance and Croke Park.

However, when such events come to the fore, the uncomfortable notion of privilege hovers over the scene. But this is every bit as true for religious prelates as it is for secular monarchs. All carry a sense of entitlement that is alien to our democratic essence. Why should these particular specimens be elevated above the common folk? In Britain the annual financial burden is colossal. The monarchy cost the British taxpayer \pounds 67m during 2018-19.

In itself, privilege can be regarded as morally neutral. It's what we do with it that matters. Do I use my influence in the cause of justice, or against it? Many neutral observers will recognise that

Queen has used the particular privileges of her position in the service of the public. But privilege can prove hard to prise from its evil twin, entitlement.

Entitlement poisons our relationship to the world around us. It can exempt us from applying to ourselves the same rules that we expect others to follow. It can infect us with a sense of impunity. It creates a culture which justifies the President who invades a

neighbouring country, claiming its territory as his due. And it exonerates the private soldier who sees looting and rape as part of his spoils of war. Less dramatically, it legitimates the man who bullies female colleagues, and the boss who abuses junior co-workers. Fail to set the right culture and otherwise high achieving, people can be led to indulge in the very behaviours they had crafted laws to ban.

Frustrated entitlement, that sense of being deprived of our rightful superior place, fuels the fires of racism and twists some to terror. Entitlement has but one known antidote, humility. Never to be confused with the humbling caused by embarrassing revelations, freely chosen humility forms an abiding attitude to life. Jesus embodied it, St Francis of Assisi exemplified it, Holy women and men of many faiths seek it. From rulers to rough sleepers, anyone, privileged or unprivileged can, if they choose, possess it.

OUR CHURCHES are open every day not just Sundays. Drop in for some quiet time, prayer and reflection. God want full custody not just weekend visits





MATTERS OF SOME INTEREST - BUILDING HOPE TASK FORCE: Dublin's Archbishop Dermot Farrell established a Task Force called Building Hope last April. The Task Force was asked to assess the needs of the people of the Archdiocese emerging from Covid-19 and to work to support parish communities as they undertake a radical renewal, looking to the future with creativity. 3,000 people, mostly lay faithful, responded to the invitation to share their views. The Task Force report is now available and is very extensive. But it is an 'active' document rather than a document to be

read and 'put down'. Some of the points raised were:

 $\Box\Box$ The value of Community

 $\Box \Box$ Importance of the Eucharist for Parish community

 $\Box \Box$ Sadness at absence of youth from liturgy and Church events.

 $\Box \Box$ Failure to recognise women as equal partners in Church.

 \Box Patriarchy and the lack of desire to collaborate with the laity.

 $\Box \Box$ Cultural gap between church and society.

A lot of work remains to be done!
