

WORLD DAY FOR GRANDPARENTS & THE ELDERLY ON SUNDAY 24th JULY 2022

... Continued from last week: One fruit that we are called to bring forth is protecting the world. "Our grandparents held us in their arms and carried us on their knees"; [5] now is the time for us to carry on our own knees – with practical assistance or with prayer alone – not only our own grandchildren but also the many frightened grandchildren whom we have not yet met and who may be fleeing from war or suffering its effects. Let us hold in our hearts – like Saint Joseph, who was a loving and attentive father – the little ones of Ukraine, of Afghanistan, of South Sudan...


Many of us have come to a sage and humble realization of what our world very much needs: the recognition that we are not saved alone, and that happiness is a

bread we break together. Let us bear witness to this before those who wrongly think that they can find personal fulfilment and success in conflict. Everyone, even the weakest among us, can do this. The very fact that we allow ourselves to be cared for – often by people who come from other countries – is itself a way of saying that living together in peace is not only possible, but necessary. Dear grandparents, dear elderly persons, we are called to be artisans of the revolution of tenderness in our world! Let us do so by learning to make ever more frequent and better use of the most valuable instrument at our disposal and, indeed, the one best suited to our age: prayer. "Let us too become, as it were, poets of prayer: let us develop a taste for finding our own words, let us once again take up those taught by the word of God".[6] Our trustful prayer can do a great deal: it can accompany the cry of pain of those who suffer, and it can help change hearts. We can be "the enduring 'chorus' of a great spiritual sanctuary, where prayers of supplication and songs of praise sustain the community that toils and struggles in the field of life".[7]

The World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly is an opportunity to proclaim once more, with joy, that the Church wants to celebrate together with all those whom the Lord – in the words of the Bible – has "filled with days". Let us celebrate it together! I ask you to make this Day known in your parishes and communities; to seek out those elderly persons who feel most alone, at home or in residences where they live. Let us make sure that no one feels alone on this day. Expecting a visit can transform those days when we think we have nothing to look forward to; from an initial encounter, a new friendship can emerge. Visiting the elderly who live alone is a work of mercy in our time! Let us ask Our Lady, Mother of Tender Love, to make all of us artisans of the revolution of tenderness, so that together we can set the world free from the spectre of loneliness and the demon of war. To all of you, and to your loved ones, I send my blessing and the assurance of my closeness and affection. And I ask you, please, not to forget to pray for me! - FRANCIS



May the girdle of Jesus and Mary Be around us on our journey May we have a safe trip



WHAT IS A PILGRIMAGE?

A Pilgrimage is a visit to a holy place to spend some time in prayer and meditation. The first pilgrimages were made to the Holy Land and to places connected to the ministry of Christ, Pilgrimages are an ancient custom in Ireland dating back to the fifth and sixth centuries. Each summer, thousands visit Lough Derg in Co. Donegal or Knock and Croagh Patrick, Co. Mayo. Croagh Patrick is known as Ireland's holiest mountain looking out on Clew Bay. According to tradition, people have climbed the mountain from the Stone Age to the present day. St. Patrick spent forty days there fasting and praying in 441AD. His bell was there for many years. A statue in his honour was erected



there in 1928 and this is the first station for the pilgrim. Next Sunday 31st July is the traditional day of pilgrimage. Mass is celebrated in the Church at the summit.

A little prayer on your Pilgrimage

Lord, make us prophets of our times, pilgrims, not wayfarers.

May each day begin with prayerful preparation, opening our hearts to a spirit of loving repentance.



May they remain constant in your love and be living signs of your presence to their children and grandchildren.




MEDALS OF FRIENDSHIP: THE HEART-WARMING STORY OF THE 1936 OLYMPICS

Shuhei Nishida and Sueo Oe refused to be divided by their medals

The 1936 Summer Olympics in Berlin was very controversial. Adolf Hitler personally saw the event as a way to promote the Nazi party's idea of white supremacy. Many countries debated boycotting the Games not only on moral grounds but also because there were serious concerns about the safety of Jewish athletes. Even so, a couple of inspiring moments managed to shine through. African American sprinter Jesse Owens won four gold medals and two Japanese athletes created the so-called "Medals of Friendship."

Pole Vault at the 1936 Olympics

85 years ago, 25,000 spectators watched American



The pair weren't just world-class athletes, they were also close personal friends. So, out of respect for each other's skills, they asked the Olympic organizers if they could share the silver medal. This time, it was the judges who flat-out refused. The Japanese team was told to decide between themselves who should go home with which medal.

Behind the Dilemma

After deliberating, it was decided that Nishida would take the silver. There are many theories as to how they came to this decision. The most popular one says that since Oe cleared the jump-off height of 4.25m on his second attempt while Nishida did it the first time, the former got the bronze medal. Although, some sources also claim that Nishida's age contributed to the decision. As Oe was four years younger, he showed reverence to his "senpai" (someone in a higher hierarchical position, usually due to their age). Yet other sources say that Keio University student Oe agreed to the bronze because, as the younger athlete, he had more chance of taking gold at the next Olympics, so he might as well let Nishida have the silver medal. However, all of these theories stand at odds with what the two men did next.

Clearly not happy with the official results of the competition, they decided to take matters into their own hands and fix it.

Creating the Medals of Friendship

Upon their return to Japan, Nishida and Oe went to a jeweller and asked him to cut both medals in half. Then they had the silver and bronze halves welded together to create two prizes that they felt better reflected their real accomplishments. A hybrid silver-bronze medal for each athlete. The two medals eventually became known as "the medals of friendship."

That doesn't mean they weren't competitive. Nishida and Oe were planning a rematch at the 1940 Olympics, which was supposed to take place in Tokyo before getting moved to Helsinki and ultimately being cancelled altogether due to the outbreak of World War II. The next opportunity for the two athletes to compete against each other at an Olympics would have been in 1952, but sadly Oe was killed during the war. Nishida ultimately lived to be 87, dying of heart failure in 1997. In 2005, the Japan Association of Athletics Federations (JAAF), of which Nishida was the honorary vice chairman, donated his



medal of friendship to Waseda University, where he studied. It remains there to this day.

It's important to remember that competition is not the only goal of the Olympics. It also stands for peace and friendship. This story embodies exactly that.

On Thursday 18th August, Knock Shrine will hold a special Day of Prayer for Peace in Ukraine and are inviting people from the Ukrainian community in Ireland and host families to attend.

Family Day: Sunday 21st August is the Anniversary of the Apparition which will coincide with the Family Day. Taking place from 11am-3pm in the beautiful grounds of the Shrine, the Family Day is a lovely opportunity for families to get together to enjoy a range of fun activities. All events and activities are free of charge and will take place on the beautiful grounds of Knock Shrine, close to the award-winning Knock Museum and Café Le Chéile.
