#### SHRULE COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP-HANDBALL ALLEYS RESTORATION

Shrule Community Partnership is an umbrella organisation consisting of representatives from local residents, Shrule NS Parents Association, Shrule/Glencorrib GAA & LGFA, Shrule NS Board of Management and Fr. Vivian Loughrey PP. The group has been formed together with the aim to progress a phased development of a multi-amenity facility which will benefit the entire parish.

Part of this proposed development is the restoration of the local Handball Alley to its former glory. In doing so, it is hoped to make people aware of its potential as an actual sports facility and perhaps for it to be used once again to play handball like our forefathers did in days gone by. It may foster within the members in the community an interest, a recognition of its potential, a revival of the game and to breathe life once again back into its walls.

Therefore, the group organised a handball exhibition in the alleys last Sunday evening as part of Heritage Week 2022. It was a lovely gathering of young and old where stories and memories were exchanged about this game, a wonderful sporting pastime of previous generations. It was a joy to see former players of a bygone era present, one of whom took part. Others recounted stories of having to gueue after Mass to get a game and often having to return in the afternoon to get the much sought after slot.

An impressive exhibition of handball was displayed in the evening by members of Belcarra and Tourmakeady Handball Clubs as well as seasoned players of different generations, junior and senior.

GAA Handball is the governing body for Handball in Ireland. It is a fast and intensive game requiring high levels of speed, excellent hand eye coordination and agility to move about the court with speed. The fitness benefits of the game are huge and it is fully inclusive. Little equipment is needed to play which makes it accessible to many-a wall and a ball. Indeed, it is often referred to as Wallball. It is so simple! It was really wonderful to hear the echoing sounds of the ball bouncing within the walls once again.

Afterwards, Michael Lang, Secretary of the Tourmakeady Handball Club, gave an excellent presentation on the history of the game of Handball and the alleys of South Mayo. He created a great awareness of the historic importance of Handball in the area, its strong connections and popularity in the region. It is recorded that a man named J.J. Egan, a world handball champion, came from Shrule.

The gathering was very well attended including Cuilleann Bourke, Trevor Hannon (both All-Ireland Handball medallists), Gemma O'Malley (Newport Handball Club and Secretary of Mayo Handball County Board), Maria Walsh (MEP) and local councillors Damian Ryan and Michael Burke.

It is envisaged that the use of this handball facility in the heart of the community will enhance the wellbeing of its members, especially our younger generation. Indeed the senior students in Shrule NS were delighted when it was organised for Cuilleann Bourke (Belcarra Handball Club and multi All-Ireland Handball medallist) to come and provide coaching sessions last June. They were so excited and enthusiastic about this new game, an old sport in the locality but a first time exposure for them to it-they loved it from the get-go! It is one of the aims of the national curriculum for children to have knowledge of their local history. Knowledge of the traditions, stories and civic commemorations such as the one that took place last Sunday evening during Heritage Week strengthens connections and transform our parish into a community.

As well as promoting the use of the handball alleys once again, Shrule Community Partnership hopes to create an All Weather Pitch and car park in the pitch beside Shrule NS. These amenities are needed in the parish and our younger generations deserve it. Facilities such as these promote an area, makes it attractive to existing residents and entices new. It can strengthen community bonds and make it a place where people want to meet, share, play, enjoy and live their lives. Great hopes and lofty ambitions for Shrule Community

JUST A THOUGHT: 100 years ago this weekend, in August 1922, the Free State was rocked by the death of its two principal leaders. Michael Collins was murdered at Béal na mBláth, and Arthur Griffith died suddenly from natural causes. Imagine the traumatic impact these events had on the fledgling state at that time! Roll on 2022, there is a huge sense of disconnection from the past, and puzzlement as to why it should matter.

This brings it own blessings, of course. We Irish have often been criticised for our obsessions with the past. Those familiar with

to be best in any point of view. History events of the pa past developme information at

the events north of the border will agree. At the same time, this lack of a sense of history represents a major impoverishment. It means that the present generation must virtually re-invent itself. It has no background, no personal story to unite and inspire, nothing to locate it in a context wider and greater than itself. The younger generation seems to be disconnected from many aspects of the present also. For many, the Church is not even a source of disappointment: it is simply not a part of their world at all. Their world is filtered through the Worldwide Web. Steadily the real world shrinks from view and a virtual world replaces it. Virtual reality is attractive because people can create these artificial worlds for themselves and therefore be gods in their own universe.

There is a third form of disconnectedness: from any sense of place. People are now more mobile than ever. There is a reluctance to form community, to connect with a locality. What are the implications of this for Church, to which the concept of community is so central?

#### WHAT DID WE LEARN DURING COVID?

It began with an expression of praise and thanksgiving for being able to join online the celebration of Sunday Mass. Soon we began to dig deeper on how this experience has impacted on our doing of worship. We had to admit the bad along with the good - and there are certainly both.

What were the long term losses and gains, the discoveries along the way? What do we need to build on, what do we need to let go, what are the lessons we can carry with us?

The place of technology in worship was mentioned.

Working with technology is risky but, without doubt, the ability of parishes to move to online celebrations was a testimony to their adaptability, creativity and commitment.

And it was certainly a hugely positive experience for people to be able to connect with their local parish through online streaming -and, of course, they can switch over to liturgy elsewhere if they don't like what the home parish is doing!

But while this provision can be maintained for those who cannot attend, it is not presented as an equal option to 'in person' attendance for those who can. The very nature of liturgy itself calls for us to gather in the first instance. How do we communicate this imperative to gather? And yet we now know the value of zoom meetings or live-streaming for sacramental preparation and that surely is a gain we can carry with us and build on...

Our conversation also included what has happened to the physical environment of our churches where we now appreciate the value of hygiene consciousness throughout our worship space, well placed and appropriately used hand sanitizers, and perspex screens that can be used to create a safe environment that looks neat and not like a lottery kiosk or bank teller's station! Are there lessons to learn from how we presented our worship spaces during lockdown?

How did or how can the space evoke a sense of prayer rather than a crime scene with spaces taped off, with notices everywhere? Can we talk about that? And are there things that we would say, categorically, should not be part of practice? On a lighter note: a water pistol for baptism! a gold-plated tweezers for the distribution of Holy Communion! sealed bags with individual miniature chalices with a little wine and even, a single host or wafer in a sealed bag!

CORONAVIRUS

#### **MATTERS OF SOME INTEREST**

**SALMAN RUSHDIE:** The author Salman Rushdie, who was stabbed roughly 10 times on last week, has been removed from a ventilator and is on the mend, his agent, Andrew Wylie, said yesterday. "The road to recovery has begun," he said. "It will be long; the injuries are severe, but his condition is headed in the right direction." Rushdie was attacked onstage minutes before he was to give a talk in western New York. Hadi Matar, a 24-year-old man from New Jersey, was arrested at the scene and charged with second-degree attempted murder and assault with a weapon. He has pleaded not guilty to the charges.

**NUCLEAR PLANT:** The main front in Russia's military onslaught on Ukraine appears to have shifted dangerously to the south, risking a catastrophe at the Zaporizhzhia nuclear station, Europe's largest nuclear power plant. There are serious risks involved there. Engineers at the power plant say that yard-thick reinforced concrete containment structures protect the reactors, even from direct hits. International concern, however, has grown that shelling could cause a fire or other damage that could lead to a nuclear accident.

**POLIO RETURNS:** Earlier this year, polio seemed almost eradicated. But cases have popped up around the world: first in Malawi, then in Pakistan, Israel and Britain. The virus was located last week in New York City's wastewater.

**OVER-ACTIVE PRIME MINISTER:** Sanna Marin, the leader of Finland, has faced scrutiny after leaked videos showed her dancing energetically, striking poses and singing with friends at private parties. "I have a family life, a work life and also my free time, and I spend time with my friends", said Marin, who also mentioned her official security detail was stationed nearby when the party took place, although they weren't inside the event. In Finland, Marin's political rivals have seized on the video to demand that the prime minister be screened for illegal narcotics, and then make the results public.
