### **JUST A THOUGHT:**

Loneliness is a major problem. It is no respecter of age or station, the scourge of married and unmarried, of young and old. It has always been part of the human condition, we must presume. And it can be accepted as a normal dimension of human experience. But psychologists and social workers insist that it has intensified in the last 20 years. It has intensified to such a degree that a great many people find that intensity intolerable. The spiralling suicide rate among our young people, and the emergence of an extensive 'drugs culture', appears to supports their



contention. When a phenomenon manifests itself on such a broad scale, it must be approached as a social problem rather than a personal one. The most fruitful approach would surely be a tentative exploration of its possible roots.

If widespread loneliness and depression are recent social manifestations, then it may be possible to locate them in recent changes in our society. A few generations ago, society was experienced as a closely-knit community. Interdependence was its hallmark. The extended family was the principal socialising agent. While it provided a general sense of social cohesion, it did have its disadvantages. (Of course many of these 'disadvantages' have emerged only with hindsight). It was a closed society. People lived in each other's pockets. Small minds tended to dominate. Strong social control was often mistaken for social cohesion. Anonymity and privacy were rare. There was little mobility, geographically or socially.

For good or ill, that entity has now unravelled. The nuclear family, not the extended family, is now our model. This switch has provided us with many blessings: greater independence, much more personal privacy, greater opportunities in life, greater mobility and greater freedom to relate to others as we choose. These have all been unmistakable gains. But satisfaction at these enormous gains may mask deeper tensions generated by this social switch.

A symbol of the psychological switch from the extended family to the nuclear family is this: today, each child has its own bedroom, often furnished with its own TV set. Their grandparents, if not their parents, would have shared a room with their siblings, if not indeed a bed. This illustrates the growing quest for privacy, and the growing presence of affluence. (The very same process has taken place in religious communities, by the way!) Privacy and affluence are closely connected: we seek our own



private life, with a private house, a private car, and so on. Now all of these are, on the surface, worthy goals, reasonable expectations of any individual in our culture. It is progress. But have we not elevated privacy to the level of a fetish? And, in our feverish quest for this fetish, are we not severing our bonds with other people? Independence, rather than interdependence, is now our hallmark. Human evolution has been painfully slow. Have our material developments outpaced our spiritual or psychic dimension? Is the spirit forced to sprint in order to catch up?

However, we cannot un-ring the bell. This is the way the world is. As Christians, we must embrace it, not reject it. After all, the human being thrives on challenge. — Fr. Dick Lyng OSA



TODAY IS THE TWENTY-THIRD SUNDAY OF THE

YEAR: The month of September and Autumn have arrived. September, season of fruitfulness, season of harvesting the corn, month of schools' re-opening, month we celebrate the feast of St. Michael. Be with us Lord during the month of September. We pray that the death penalty, which attacks the dignity of the human person, may be legally abolished in every country. The following prayer for September is from the collection Feac do Ghlúin. We will keep forever in our memory Mary, Mother of Jesus who rode on a donkey to a bitterly cold stable, Her baby was born at midnight. And angels from Heaven came singing and rejoicing.

#### **CONSULTATION RESULTS**

There are "many challenges for the handing on of the faith" in Ireland, according to the Irish bishops, responding to the national synthesis of the synodal process. The challenges include a need for inner healing and hope, especially among those who have suffered abuse by church personnel and in church institutions, the bishops said. In a letter accompanying the report sent to Cardinal Mario Grech, secretary general of the Synod of Bishops, the leader of the Irish Church, Archbishop Eamon Martin, said the synthesis, which is the fruit of consultations with tens of thousands of Irish Catholics, acknowledges the impact in recent decades of a major decline in the practice of the faith, and in vocations to priesthood and religious life.

The landmark document, published last week, calls for greater transparency; greater lay participation in decision making as well as accountability within parish and diocesan church structures. It indicates a strong desire for fresh models of leadership to recognise and facilitate the role of women, as well as men. These include ordination to the diaconate and priesthood.

Among the 13 themes in the document is one on clergy which highlights the appreciation for priests among the faithful and a recognition that they are over-worked and often feel burdened by the weight of governance and administration.

Another overarching thread evident throughout the consultation, the report notes, is that the gifts of lay-people are under-utilised by the Church. Sarah McDonald, **The Tablet,** 27-8-2022




### "Thank you for sharing your mother day and daughter day with me. Mary."
