

THE FUTURE OF OUR CHURCH: In his homily for Reek Sunday Tuam Archbishop Duffy likened the challenge of the pilgrim's climb with the ever increasing challenges facing our Church; 'There are no quick fix solutions or approaches... Instead we journey together on a path that will have many twists and turns and will not always be easy. All developments, innovations and continuity must serve Jesus Christ. We can be confident in this because Christ promised the Holy Spirit to be with us and we continue to pray for His guidance.

The context in which we embark on this path has many expectations but there is one certainty, and one key essential component. The one certainty is the ongoing and sustained decline both in the numbers who practice and in the numbers of those who answer the Lord's call to priesthood and religious life. Each diocese has its own story of this reality. Every parish will be effected by this in terms of the number of clergy available and the number and frequency of Masses. All trends are dramatically downwards with no turning point in sight. I suggest you look at your priest, he may be the last in a long line of resident pastors and may not be replaced. I suggest you look at your church, you may be lucky to have a Sunday Mass or several, but for how much longer? I suggest you look at your fellow parishioners at Mass, who among your neighbours will continue to be the new leaders and carry on pastoral work in your parish, alongside a much smaller number of clergy? Who among them will lead prayer services and keep faith alive and active through catechesis and other initiatives?'

Archbishop Duffy concluded. 'Should we give up? Certainly not, nor should we let the situation drift. This is a time of decline in some respect but it is a time of great hope. Opportunities are there to be seized. Is this a good time to be a priest, or, is this a good time to consider becoming a priest, to answer that call? It is the best of times to be a priest, challenging - yes, with risks - yes, with God on our side - yes. Is this the time to be silent about the Good News of Jesus Christ and to relegate it to the back pages? No, definitely not. This is a time for faith, faith into action, faith into reaching out. 'I arise today, through a mighty strength, the invocation of the Trinity, through belief in the Threeness, through confession of the Oneness of the creator of creation'. Christ be with us, Christ is Fr. Tod Nolan, Burrishoole Parish. with us.'

THANK YOU GOD:

The ancient Celts had four great feasts in the year. These were *Samhain* (Halloween in modern times) which was the beginning of the Celtic year; *Imbolc* (first day of Spring) or the end of winter; *Bealtaine* (May Day) the start of summer and *Lughnasa* celebrating the bounty of the Harvest. We can celebrate the beginning of Autumn by giving thanks to God for the crops and the fruitfulness of creation which he gives us in abundance and for those who work in agriculture and food production.

JUST A THOUGHT: For those who have to move house. It's the decision-making that wears you down. Yet as the scribe in the bible wrote, such decisions are inevitable. "There is a time everything under heaven: a time to scatter and a time to gather, a time to keep and a time to throw away." Should I keep or discard this shirt? Will I ever again wear this jacket? And all those socks? Do I really need so many? Most of us have only two feet! And the books? How many of those will I return to again? The Oxford Dictionary? The Jerusalem Bible? The Jerome Biblical Commentary? The Complete Works of Shakespeare?



But even reference books, like dictionaries and commentaries, are now all but redundant, thanks to the Internet. Perhaps this is an opportunity to lighten my load? So moving house may not be such a negative experience after all? `

However, when I look outside my own comfort zone, I realise how minor and miserable is my present predicament. The nightly news on television reveals a far more harsh reality. The wildfires that have been burning in North America and Europe, destroying natural habitats and people's homes, are a frightening symptom of our planet heating up. But the question that has continually come into my mind is 'What would I take with me if I had to leave my home in such circumstances, with perhaps an hour's notice?' Or, as refugees from Ukraine had to do, bale out at the last minute with nothing but the clothes on their back (and perhaps a cat under their arm)? Would I have the presence of mind to take my passport, credit cards, mobile phone and laptop? After that, what? Old photos that haven't yet been uploaded onto virtual platforms, those perhaps of siblings at a family gathering like a wedding or a baptism? Or the under-14 County hurling medal I won with my native parish so many years ago? (Even medals won from the subs' bench are cherished!) Objects that remind me of my parents or friends might be important, or a few special books from the many on my shelves. I would take an armful of Seamus Heaney's poetry books. They are light (physically!), a delight to read and signed by the author. Every one of his twelve books in my possession carries a personal message appropriate to that book. What a thoughtful man!

Perhaps, though, I would only think of preserving my own life or of making sure my neighbours had been alerted to the threat and so would leave my house with nothing. Mind exercises like this force us to think about what is important in our lives – material things, memories, or the immediate needs of those around us. Jesus and his followers travelled light. "Take nothing for your journey" he told them, "neither staff nor script nor bread nor money, and neither have two coats." And, in another place he tells them (and us), "Where your treasure is, there too will your heart be." He warned us against being spiritually fettered to our material possessions and perhaps even to our memories.

If I lived up to these insights, fleeing my home, I should rush to help my elderly neighbour escape the fire without thought of self. Yet would I do this? My attachment to the objects that have made me who I am, may be too strong to ignore or discard in a crisis.

However, I'd like to think I could remain selfless and still have time to grab my credit cards! Possessions, though, are transitory. In most cases, compassion is permanent. -Fr Dick Lyng OSA.







NATIONAL NOVENA AT KNOCK SHRINE - 'A JOURNEY IN HOPE'

The National Novena to Our Lady of Knock will take place from Sunday 14th – Monday 22nd August, offering nine days of reflection and prayer and a chance to connect with your faith in the unique and sacred space of Knock Shrine. This year's theme is 'A Journey in Hope'.

Following a two-year break due to the pandemic, Fr Richard Gibbons hopes to make this year extra special for all who will be travelling to the Shrine to take part.

"The purpose of the Novena is to recognise the unique role that Knock, as an International Eucharistic and Marian Shrine, has to play in the life of the Irish Church and to honour Our Lady.



So many of the people who joined us online over the course of the pandemic are now coming back to visit the Shrine which is great to see. The Novena is always a very special highlight of the year, and we are delighted to be able to proceed with it this year.

We look to the future with the hope of renewal, for God's guidance and pray that this Novena will offer pilgrims the chance for thought-provoking reflection and discussion. "

Ceremonies will take place at Knock Basilica at 3pm and 8pm over the course of the nine days with guest speakers present during each ceremony. There will also be the special candlelight procession, a traditional feature of the Novena at Knock, which takes place following the 8pm ceremony (weather permitting).

On Thursday 18th August, Knock Shrine will hold a special Day of Prayer for Peace in Ukraine and are inviting people from the Ukrainian community in Ireland and host families to attend.

Family Day: Sunday 21st August is the Anniversary of the Apparition which will coincide with the Family Day. Taking place from 11am-3pm in the beautiful grounds of the Shrine, the Family Day is a lovely opportunity for families to get together to enjoy a range of fun activities. All events and activities are free of charge and will take place on the beautiful grounds of Knock Shrine, close to the award-winning Knock Museum and Café Le Chéile. There will be outdoor activities taking place on the green (weather permitting) and marquees with indoor workshops, games and more.

POPE FRANCIS SPEAKS ABOUT HIS HEALTH

IN THE 40 MINUTE news conference that the Pope held on his return flight to Rome from Canada on 29th July, Francis talked about his own future, as well as the remarkable journey he had just completed. Earlier that day, he apologised again to survivors of Canada's residential schools, the majority Catholic-run and government-funded, and said it was his hope to "shed light on what happened and move beyond that dark past."

On the plane, an Indigenous reporter asked why Francis did not use the word genocide while in Canada. "It's true, I didn't use the word because it didn't come to my mind, but I described the genocide and asked for forgiveness for this activity that is genocidal. Yes, genocide is a technical word. I didn't use it because it didn't come to my mind, but I described it... yes, it s genocide. You can all stay calm about this. You can report that I said that it was genocide."

On the impact of his health issues on his foreign travels - the acute pain in his knee meant he needed a wheelchair throughout his visit - Francis said: "This trip was a bit of a test" to see how much he could handle and how much of what was considered a standard part of a papal trip was really necessary. "Perhaps we will have to change the style a bit, reduce a bit," he said. But Francis said he still hopes to visit Kyiv - "we'll see what's possible" - as well as Kazakhstan in September for an interreligious meeting. "I have all the good will" to keep travelling, the Pope said, "but we'll have to see what the leg says."



He said he wants to reschedule his postponed ecumenical trip to South Sudan with Archbishop Justin Welby of Canterbury and the Revd lain Greenshields, moderator of the Church of Scotland. On the possibility of his retiring, Francis said: "The door is open. It is one of the normal options, but up to now I haven't knocked on that door. I haven't felt like I needed to consider this possibility, but that doesn't mean that the day after tomorrow I won't start thinking about it. Stepping aside would not be a catastrophe. You can change popes, no problem." **-The Tablet**

WE ARE NOT ALL IN THE SAME BOAT:




