

Easter Dues envelopes are now available at the back of the church for those who do not use the envelope system. If you are using the envelopes available at church, and are planning to apply for charity tax rebate, please write your name and envelope number on envelope.

What are Dues Envelopes? The Easter Dues envelopes along with Christmas and Autumn Dues pay the salary of the priest of the parish, diocesan levy (calculated by curate's salary) and contribute to the support of retired clergy, clergy working in offices and clergy in underprivileged areas of the diocese. The current salary for the priest of the diocese is €1,450 per calendar month.

What is the Weekly Offertory Collection for then? It is a common misunderstanding that the weekly offertory collection is for the priest. In actually fact, the weekly offertory collections is for the upkeep and running of the parish. It does not form any part of the priest's income or salary. Thank you in advance for your continued support & generosity in these difficult and challenging times.

TOUCHING THE HOLY

I don't know if I'll ever get back into the habit of shaking hands! When I do shake hands now I am very aware of it and have to consciously decide to offer my hand. The ritual of hand shaking is much more than just a greeting - it is an opening up to the other, it is an offer of acceptance of the other for who they are, it is the making of a physical connection. It is the touch which is all



important. Other cultures have different ways of greeting, but touch is always part of it - Eskimos rub noses, the French touch cheeks, in New Zealand the Maori gently tap foreheads. There is something about touch which connects us to the other. As Catholic Christians, we love to be able to touch the sacred. Somehow touch brings us out of ourselves and connects us to the eternal.

There is a bronze statue in St Peter's in Rome which has lost one of its toes through century's long tradition of pilgrims touching the foot of the anonymous saint. When we visit Knock we want to touch the apparition wall, in times of sickness or distress it is the touch of the sacred relic which often brings comfort and consolation, the physical lighting of a blessed candle is far more meaningful than the turning on of a switch. We make a point of being marked with ashes, we are eager to have our throats blessed with candles. Our Christian lives begin with the sprinkle of Holy Water and our time on this earth ends with the touch of Sacred Oil.


This weekend we begin our celebration of Holy Week - an tSeachtain Mor. It is the most sacred time of the Church's year - the time of year when the slender line between the sacred and the profane is at its thinnest. As if to help ease the connection of the two the rituals of this week are full of the physical and the tactile; the washing of the feet, the kissing of the cross, the lighting of the Easter fire, the blessing of holy water. The rituals of Holy Week help us to stretch beyond ourselves as we reach for the sacred.

Holy Week begins with the procession and blessing of the Palm. Remembering Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem the ritual reminds us that we too are called to welcome Jesus into our hearts. It is our tradition to bring the blessed palm home and to give it a place



or prominence in our house - on the mantel piece, above a door or behind the picture of the Sacred Heart. It is a sign for us of God's presence in our home and of our willingness to follow his Way.

Palm Sunday is sometimes called Passion Sunday because it is the Sunday on which the Passion of Jesus is read. It is the Sunday of the long Gospel. The people who enthusiastically welcomed Jesus into Jerusalem shouting 'Hosanna' are the very same people who shout 'crucify him' just days later. The palm which we bless on Palm Sunday becomes the Ashes with which we are marked on Ash Wednesday. We spend our lives someplace between both days but always reaching for the holy. *Fr. A hypocrite is one who deliberately tries to deceive others, trying to make people think you are better than you are.


It is saying one thing and doing just the opposite, one who does not practice what he preaches. "Do what I say, not what I do."

FRANCIS PLANS THREE MORE TRIPS

The pain in his knee makes walking difficult and during his visit to Malta last weekend Pope Francis used a lifting platform to get on and off the papal plane. On the way back to Rome, the 85-year-old Roman pontiff admitted that his health is "fickle" and at his age "You don't know how the game will end."

Nevertheless, he is determined to make maximum use of the time he has left on the field. Speaking to reporters who had travelled with him to the Maltese islands, the Pope explained he was weighing up three possible visits as part of his efforts to try and bring an end the war in Ukraine.

The first is a trip to Kyiv. While this would have an enormous symbolic impact, a visit to the Ukraine capital would be fraught with complexity and there would be dire security risks. It would also represent something of a last throw of the diplomatic dice by the Holy See. One Vatican source told me that the Pope would be more likely to visit Kyiv if he could also go to Moscow.

Simply going to Ukraine might end any hopes the Holy See might have had of playing a role as a mediator in the war.

Also on the table is a visit to Poland, which would allow Francis to show his solidarity with the more than 2.3 million Ukrainians who have fled across the border. During a private audience on Friday $1^{\rm st}$ April, Poland's president, Andrzej Buda, invited the Pope to visit his country; it would be relatively simple to arrange.

The third possibility, he said, is a visit to the Middle East for a face-to-face meeting with Patriarch Kirill of Moscow, the leader of the Russian Orthodox Church. This could happen in Lebanon, which the Pope is expected to visit this year. Francis held a video call with Kirill last month and is keeping the channel of dialogue open in the hope he could persuade the Patriarch to call for a ceasefire. It would be a huge gamble; Kirill is showing no sign of reducing his support for Vladimir Putin's war, and any meeting with the Russian Patriarch could be seized on as giving credibility to the Putin-Kirill axis.



Even though every step he takes is a painful struggle, and his pleas for peace seem to be falling on deaf ears, Francis is determined to keep going.



FORMED IN FAITH

This year, for the first time in two years we will again celebrate Easter as a community. For the past two years I had the strange and unwelcome experience of celebrating Easter in an empty church. Although aware that the ceremonies were being broadcast into homes across the parish somehow it felt as if the sacred rituals were being performed for the camera rather than being celebrated by the community. Ritual of its very nature is much more than a spectacle, we do more than watch – we participate. In nourishing the soul ritual speaks to all our senses – smell, sight, sound, touch and taste.

The Easter Ceremonies are rich with ritual: the washing of the feet on Holy Thursday, the kissing of the Cross on Good Friday, the lighting of the Paschal Fire and its procession through the darkened church on Holy Saturday night. These simple gestures are a physical affirmation of our faith in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. But they are more than that. The ritual of the Holy Week ceremonies somehow draws us in and forms us in a way that stories and words can't. They are profound moments of experience which give us our identity as Catholic Christians. They not only make us who we are but they illuminate what we are

Although often lost in the shadow of Christmas, Easter is the most significant feast of the Christian calendar. Our faith is not in the fact that Jesus was born some 2000 years ago, our faith is in the Risen Jesus who lives within and among us now.



Holy week begins this week. It is a solemn and sacred time as we move from Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem (Palm Sunday), through his Last Supper with his disciples (Holy Thursday), his suffering and death on the cross (Good Friday) to his Resurrection on Easter Sunday morning. Easter is a time of huge significance for people of faith, and for the faith of people, and yet it is a time which is largely overlooked by many believers.

While chatting with group of young people during the week I realised that many if not most had no experience of any of the Easter rituals. They had never been to Holy Thursday Mass, never attended the ceremony of the Passion and Veneration of the Cross on Good Friday and never experienced the church in darkness on Holy Saturday night. In terms of their faith development they have missed out on perhaps the most powerful and formative moments of ritual our faith offers us.

Holy Week is the most sacred time of our Church's year. We are Easter people and our story is told and experienced in and through the rituals of Holy Week. The ceremonies of Holy Week are punctuated with deeply meaningful and significant moments; rituals which form us as a followers of Jesus Christ and as a community of faith.


A WORD IN YOUR EAR...

Every weekend since the Russian invasion of the Ukraine on February 24th I have written on the subject here, for the simple reason that it is impossible to write on any other topic. The war has pushed everything else off the front pages, and rightly so. I have rarely seen our parliament so engrossed by a speaker as they were by the virtual words of the President of Ukraine Volodymyr Zelenskyy on Thursday last. His speech was spell-binding, yet simple.

Last weekend I touched upon the relationship between photo-journalism and war. I wrote about the power of one photograph to define an entire war. I pointed to the 9 year old naked 'Napalm' girl in Vietnam as an example. When images of that war are called up, invariably she tops the list.

The world was horrified on Sunday last by a picture taken near the Ukrainian capital, Kyiv. It shows the bodies of one man and three women piled under a blanket. The women were naked and their bodies had been partially burned. These harrowing images adds to a mounting body of evidence that summary executions, rape and torture have been used against civilians in areas under Russian control since the Kremlin invaded on 24 February.

Each day that passes, more and more reports of rape and sexual assault against Ukrainian women and girls have



But as is always the case, these crimes are underreported. In fact they can get lost within the narrative that rape and sexual assault are the inevitable consequence of war. What's more, the focus on evidence of mass rape for it to be deemed a war crime, distorts the personal nature of the complete devastation women can experience. For those who survive, their trauma will be lived out in fragments of what they remember, the courage to tell their truth, and the loneliness of living with their secrets.


So much of the evidence about survivors of rape during and after war, speaks of the shame and rejection women and girls experience from their own immediate families. Husbands feel humiliated and parents feel the stigma of dishonour. And in almost every religion, Christianity and Islam included, despite the



equality of all in God's eyes, women have struggled for recognition, respect and equality. St Paul had some strange things to say about the role of women: "If women want to inquire about something, they should ask their own husbands at home; for it is disgraceful for a woman to speak in the church." [1 Cor. 14] Similar sentiments are found in the Qur'anic verse "Men are the maintainers of women." This verse still leads to divided opinions between those who see it as requiring men to protect their families, and those who see it as a license to control their wives.

I am not suggesting for a moment that St Paul or the Koran are to blame for the criminal behaviour of the invading Russian soldiers. But we should be aware of the anachronistic attitude to women contained in some of our sacred texts. Who is to say that this misogyny didn't contribute in some small way to the formation of the general culture that produced these monsters?

PARISH NOTES: WAYS TO MAKE CONTRIBUTIONS:

With the resumption of public liturgies, the following ways now in place to make contributions. These contributions make the works been carried out possible. SPIRITUAL COMMUNION PRAYER:



CIVILIANS FLEE EASTERN UKRAINE

Alarmed at signs that Russia's invasion force is about to escalate assaults in eastern Ukraine, many civilians in that region are fleeing. The exodus accelerated as Western nations moved to provide more weapons to Ukraine's military and to further ostracize Russia economically with new sanctions over the atrocities in Bucha.

The EU also was weighing a ban on coal from Russia, the leading provider of fossil-fuel energy to Europe, and Russia appeared to move closer to defaulting on its foreign debt



because of U.S. currency restrictions. In his nightly address, Volodymyr Zelensky, the Ukrainian president, challenged allies to find the determination to ban Russian oil.

Hampered by poor planning and low morale, the Russian military has retreated from the Kyiv area and has apparently abandoned the effort to capture the capital. But that does not mean its forces cannot undertake a powerful new assault in the east.

Refugees: More than 11 million Ukrainians — roughly one in four — have fled their homes, according to the U.N., including more than four million who have fled the country. 10,000 have arrived in Ireland,

In other news from the war:

- The U.S. said it had secretly removed malware from computer networks around the world in recent weeks, a step to pre-empt Russian cyber-attacks.
- Russian forces appear to be using a new type of land mine equipped with sensors that can detect when people walk nearby.
