The Word of the Lord

The readings we listen to each Sunday at Mass may seem familiar but in fact, for the most part, we only hear those particular readings every three years. Our Sunday readings follow a three-year cycle. In Year A, we read from the Gospel of Matthew. In Year B, we read the Gospel of Mark and chapter 6 of the Gospel of John and in Year C, we read the Gospel of Luke. The Gospel of John is read during Easter time in all three years.

At our weekend Masses the first reading, usually from the Old Testament, reflects important themes from the Gospel reading of the day. The second reading is from the New Testament and usually from one of the epistles, a letter written to an early church community.

This is Year C of the three year cycle and so our Gospel readings for this year will be predominantly from St Luke's Gospel.

Luke was not one of the twelve apostles, in fact he probably never met Jesus. He was a companion of St Paul and from Paul we know that Luke was a 'physician' – a doctor of his time. Writing some 30 years after the death of Jesus Luke writes 'exactly as was handed down by those who from the outset were eyewitnesses'.

Luke, being a gentile, writes his Gospel with a particular concern for readers who are not Jews. He is keen to explain Jewish customs but also anxious to emphasise that Jesus' ministry was not confined to Jews alone, but that Jesus' ministry was universal and inclusive of all. It is perhaps because Luke wasn't a Jew by birth that his Gospel is dominated by a concern for the outsider. Luke for example, alone of the four Gospel writers, has the parable of the Good Samaritan, a parable which must have rankled the devout Jew of his time. And Jesus' concern for the outcast of society takes flesh in Luke's telling of such stories as Jesus curing of the ten lepers – a miracle unique to Luke's Gospel. As we read through St Luke's Gospel it might be interesting to note the prominent role played by women in his Gospel. It is in Luke that a woman anoints the feet of Jesus, it is a widow who gives

her two mites in the synagogue, a woman who finds the lost coin and it is to the home of Mary and Martha that Jesus chooses to visit. When all the men have abandoned Jesus at Calvary it is women who stay by his side, it is women who leave the frightened men in the upper room and who go to anoint the body of Jesus, women are the first to witness the empty tomb and it is women who are the first to be told that Jesus is risen.

Luke is a consummate story teller and some of the best known stories of our Christian tradition are unique to Luke's Gospel. We owe our telling of the Christmas nativity for example to St Luke's Gospel as we do the story of the young Jesus being lost in the temple. It is only in Luke that the magnificent parable of the Prodigal Son is found and Luke alone tells that beautiful story - and my favourite, of the post Resurrection encounter at Emmaus between Jesus and his two disheartened disciples.

This is Luke's year. Who doesn't love a good story?
