#### WORLD DAY FOR GRANDPARENTS & THE ELDERLY ON SUNDAY 24<sup>th</sup> JULY 2022

... Continued from last week.

Yet that same psalm – "Do not cast me off in the time of old age; forsake me not when my strength is spent" which meditates on how the Lord has been present at every stage of our lives – urges us to persevere in hope. Along with old age and white hairs, God continues to give us the gift of life and to keep us from being overcome by evil. If we trust in him, we will find the strength to praise him still (cf. vv. 14-20). We will come to see that growing old is more than the natural decline of the body or the inevitable passage of time, but the gift of a long life. Aging is not a condemnation, but a blessing! For this reason, we ought to take care of ourselves and remain active in our later



years. This is also true from a spiritual standpoint: we ought to cultivate our interior life through the assiduous reading of the word of God, daily prayer, reception of the sacraments and participation in the liturgy. In addition to our relationship with God, we should also cultivate our relationships with others: first of all by showing affectionate concern for our families, our children and grandchildren, but also for the poor and those who suffer, by drawing near to them with practical assistance and our prayers. These things will help us not to feel like mere bystanders, sitting on our porches or looking out from our windows, as life goes on all around us. Instead, we should learn to discern everywhere the presence of the Lord.[2] Like "green olive trees in the house of God" (cf. *Ps* 52:10), we can become a blessing for those who live next to us.

Old age is no time to give up and lower the sails, but a season of enduring fruitfulness: a new mission awaits us and bids us look to the future. "The special sensibility that those of us who are elderly have for the concerns, thoughts and the affections that make us human should once again become the vocation of many. It would be a sign of our love for the younger generations".[3] This would be our own contribution to the *revolution of tenderness*,[4] a spiritual and non-violent revolution in which I encourage you, dear grandparents and elderly persons, to take an active role.

Our world is passing through a time of trial and testing, beginning with the sudden, violent outbreak of the pandemic, and then by a war that is harming peace and development on a global scale. Nor is it a coincidence that war is returning to Europe at a time when the generation that experienced it in the last century is dying out. These great crises risk anaesthetizing us to the reality of other "epidemics" and other widespread forms of violence that menace the human family and our common home.

All this points to the need for a profound change, a conversion that disarms hearts and leads us to see others as our brothers or sisters. We grandparents and elderly people have a great responsibility: to teach the women and men of our time to regard others with the same understanding and loving gaze with which we regard our own grandchildren. We ourselves have grown in humanity by caring for others, and now we can be teachers of a way of life that is peaceful and attentive to those in greatest need. This attitude may be mistaken for weakness or resignation, yet it will be the meek, not the aggressive and the abusive, who will inherit the earth (cf. *Mt* 5:5). *Pope Francis.* 

#### WORLD DAY FOR GRANDPARENTS & THE ELDERLY – 'BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE':



**JUST A THOUGHT:** A priest from Ennis, Co. Clare tells the story of his first Sunday in his new Parish Sacred Heart, Wilbur, Washington. He had said the morning masses in a couple of parishes and he was all set to watch a game of football on the T.V. when the doorbell rang and there at the door was a big Indian from across the river who said "*I am here to welcome you father and have dinner with you*" The priest thought he might be bringing a takeaway with him, but no. The priest himself was to have the privilege of cooking and



serving him dinner. Luckily, the priest had enough in the house to make a decent dinner for the two of them and they talked the day away.

Later in the week the priest had a funeral on the Reservation across the river. After the burial he went home and thought no more about it. Then a day later he was playing a game of golf and met a couple of native Americans who told him that he was in big trouble with Little Bear— the Indian who came to welcome him and eat with him the Sunday before. On the way home from the funeral in the Reservation the priest passed the Indian's house and failed to visit him and give him the privilege of hospitality. When the priest heard this, he got in his car right away and drove over to visit Little Bear and apologise for not honouring him by giving his Indian friend the opportunity to be hospitable and provide food and drink of welcome.

The priest learned a lot from Little Bear about hospitality. He thought of it as a duty, an imposition; from him and his tribe he learned it was a privilege.

Abraham welcomed his visitors with Joy and provided for them. Mary welcomed Jesus and gave Him the company he needed. For Martha the duties of hospitality took the joy out of her welcome. Real hospitality needs both the word of welcome and the cup of tea and sandwich.

We in Ireland think of ourselves as the people of "*a hundred thousand welcomes".* We must not let fear close our door to the stranger or greed shut our hearts to those in need.

#### A WORD IN YOUR EAR...

Sir Mo Farah, CBE, is a multiple Olympic, World and European Champion athlete. He disclosed this week that he was trafficked into Britain illegally from Somalia under the name of another child.

"The truth is I'm not who you think I am," the 39-year-old Farah told the BBC in a documentary. He was born in Somalia as Hussein Abdi Kahin. When he was four his father was killed in the civil war, and his family was torn apart. He was brought into the UK illegally under the name of another child called Mohamed Farah. He was made to work as a domestic servant and was forced to look after another family's children.

Farah said he thought he was going to Europe to live with relatives. He recalled going through a British passport check under the guise of 'Mohamed' at the age of nine after travelling with a woman he didn't know. "I had all contact details for my relative and once we got to her house, the lady took it off me and ripped them up and put it in the bin. At that moment I knew I was in trouble, he said. Farah eventually told his PE teacher the truth and moved to live with his friend's mum. He ended up staying with her for seven years. Farah has since been in touch with his birth mother and with the boy (now man) whose identity he assumed. He was recognised as a British citizen in 2000, and knighted in 2013.



To say that the slave trade was one of history's most egregious wrongs is hardly controversial. To establish what should be done to atone for it, by whom, and to whom, is more complicated. Recently a report by the Church of England made clear that the funds used throughout the eighteenth century to support Church of England clergy were drawn from investments in a company that transported slaves across the Atlantic. And that those same funds have now evolved into the portfolio managed by the Church. A Church spokesman pointed out how the response to an examination of racism and the exposure of injustice is often one of denial, defensiveness and delay. The first speech made by Jesus is a call to repentance. But what does repentance mean in a case like this? Can you repent for the crimes of your forebears? The perpetrators and victims are, after all, long dead. You can start by making a list of what you can and can't do. You can't prosecute those responsible. But you can recognise that, while 40% of the national budget in 1834 went on

compensating former slave owners, not a penny went on compensating former slaves, then or since. You can't easily identify what kind of compensation might be appropriate for Mo Farrah, for instance? Or for a whole race?

Repentance means admitting past wrongs, and working together with the one you've damaged - not as a punishment but as an investment in a better future.

Half of repentance is making amends for past wrongs. The other half is facing up to present complicity. You can't do one without the other. Repentance in the end isn't trying in vain to change what happened 300 years ago, or 30 years



ago. It's about individuals, institutions, and governments changing what happens today - and tomorrow. Dick Lyng OSA.



#### THE BOG


I was in the bog yesterday, when I heard my mother's words spilling out of my mouth... "Keep back from them bog holes"... "Stay where I can see ya"... "this is no place for wandering off as you could fall in a sink hole & if that happens we might never find you again"... I was met with eyes rolling up to Heaven and I couldn't help but smile to myself as I just knew Nanny Carmel was sharing a flask of tea with Karma and enjoying the show...

In fairness, for anyone who's been reading my stories of late, you know that my mother was well justified in her stern warnings to me... because I, was definitely a flight risk!

Nowadays we only go for an hour or two at a time, but as a child, a trip to the bog meant the whole day would be spent there. It was a family affair, only Granny Nora got to stay home. The bog was in Cloonbar and we would drive from Shrule while Mick (my grandad) would often cycle from Belclare. He cycled everywhere in those days and thought nothing of it. My grandmother would send a feed of beef sandwiches with an inch of butter and half a gallon of salt, there'd be flasks of tea and glass bottles of milk and if you were lucky some Ribena and maybe even a packet of Goldgrain biscuits!

If I was at home, I'd have turned my nose up at so much butter on a sandwich, but somehow in the bog, it was perfectly acceptable... my mother would pass comments like... "Hunger is a great sauce" when she'd see me scoffing them down (another eye rolling opportunity that I'm sure I didn't pass up). The grownups would drink tea and I used to think it was so cool how they just flung the remaining drops from the last round onto the ground before getting a fresh sup in the cup! Only in the bog did you have the freedom to fling it into the air and watch it soak into the sod... no mopping required!

Today I look out across the bogged landscape and it looks exactly the same as it did when I was a child... the gorgeous dark sod, the stunning yellow gorse flowers and the little white puffs of bog cotton everywhere and of course the drains... the much warned about, dangerous, lethal bog holes that were poised to swallow up wandering children!



Without trying too hard, I can imagine the slim tall frame of my grandfather off in the distance, with his broad shoulders and black hair that always looked greasy because it was lathered in brylcream! That little guiff that he styled in on purpose every morning would be dangling down his forehead from the heat of the sun and the sweat of hard work. The white vest laying ba re his very long arms that showed off two different levels of sun exposure... from the elbow down was a caramel tan in contrast to the upper half which resembled creamy milk from a glass bottle. My dad would be the other end, not as tall, but with strong biceps and a healthy red glow of freckles and sunburn. Two silhouettes I can easily visualise as I look out over this beautiful landscape as if it were actually unfolding before my eyes right now.

While hours in the bog don't fill me with joy,

I can't deny that feeling I get when I walk across the soft land.

There's a deeper knowing within me that recognises and salutes the generations of men and women who have walked it before me. I love land; it always has a story... *Geraldine Monaghan*
