Introduction

The Annual report 2019 sets out how the County Mayo Joint Policing Committee carried out its functions for this period in accordance with Section 36(2) of the Garda Síochána Act 2005 and in accordance with the revised Joint Policing Committee Guidelines 2014.

Role of the Joint Policing Committee

The legislative framework for the establishment of Joint Policing Committees is set out in Section 36(2) of the Garda Síochána Act 2005.

Section 36(2) provides that the Joint Policing Committee is to serve as a forum for consultations, discussions and recommendations on matters affecting the policing of the local authority's administrative area. The Act refers specifically to the following matters:

- Keep under review
 - (a) the levels and patterns of crime, disorder and anti-social behaviour (including the patterns and levels of misuse of alcohol and drugs) and
 - (b) the underlying factors that contribute to these issues.
- Advise the local authority and the Garda Síochána on how they might best perform their functions and do everything feasibly possible to improve the safety and quality of life, to prevent crime, disorder and anti-social behaviour.
- Arrange and host public meetings concerning matters affecting the policing of the local authorities' administrative area.
- Establish in consultation with the local Garda Superintendent and specific neighbourhoods, local policing fora to discuss and make recommendations to the JPC.
- Co-ordinate the activities of local policing fora.

Item 2: Please highlight three key achievements of the JPC during the year and give reasons why they are significant.

Achievement 1

Mayo County Council's Anti-Social Behaviour Strategy

At the February meeting of the JPC Committee the Draft Anti-Social Behaviour Strategy was circulated for consideration. Julie Ryan, Tenancy Sustainment Officer, Mayo County Council was present at the meeting to answer any questions.

Questions were raised in relation to income limits for admission to public housing and the basis of complaints the 'threat to life' being a very high bar to reach. All comments and observations were taken on board and the Strategy was adopted by the full Council on 13th May 2019.

Achievement 2

Community Engagement - Policing Plan 2020

Senior Gardai from around the county attended two meetings of the JPC in 2019 to consult with the members to formulate the Policing Plan 2020 for Community Engagement. As a result of this consultation process, this committee has fed into this plan and issues raised have been taken on board by the Community Policing Division of An Garda Síochána.

Achievement 3

Presentation by Garda Commissioner Drew Harris.

Garda Commissioner Drew Harris was invited to address the committee to explain the impact the new Garda Organisational changes would have on policing in County Mayo.

The Commissioner attended the JPC meeting on 8th November 2019 and outlined the new Divisional Policing Plan which has resulted in Mayo, Roscommon and Longford all being restructured into one new division.

Members raised a number of serious concerns regarding the potential impact of this new plan on the county. Issues raised were:-

- > The implications of the inclusion of Mayo with Longford and Roscommon given the vast size and complex geography of the area.
- Assurances were sought that there wouldn't be a reduction in the number of Gardai in Mayo as a result of this new model.
- Assurances were sought in relation to the support from An Garda Síochána in the provision of community CCTV.
- ➤ Given that there has been no increase in the resources servicing the drugs unit in Co Mayo in the past 5 years, confirmation was sought that more resources will be allocated to address rising drug related crime?
- Members sought details of the review mechanism for the plan and if it can be changed if its is not working.
- Members sought details of how many new garda would be appointed to Mayo under the new garda recruitment programme.
- Clarification was sought in relation to the role of the traffic core.
- Information was sought on whether additional resources will be allocated to policing coercive control under the new domestic violence legislation.

As a result of this meeting Mayo JPC have written to the Commissioner for an update on these issues and are currently awaiting a response.
