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



LEARNING ABOUT THE MASS WITH KATH & OUMEN - THE LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST



EUCHARIST: The word '**Eucharist'** is another name for the Mass. It comes from a Greek word meaning '**thanksgiving'**. The whole Mass is a special prayer of thanksgiving for all that God has given us. We also talk about the sacrifice of the Mass. This reminds us of

the sacrifice that Jesus made for us when he suffered and died on the cross. **THE ALTAR:** Another word for altar is table. The altar table is in the centre of the part of God's house that we call the sanctuary. Sanctuary means 'holy' and this is indeed a holy place. The servers prepare the altar. They put the following on the altar:

- **The Corporal:** A square-shaped white cloth on which the paten and chalice are placed
- The Roman Missal: The book from which the priest reads the prayers
- **The Purificators:** Small white towels which are used to clean the chalice and paten later in the Mass.



OFFERING THE GIFTS - AN OLD CUSTOM



In the early Church people brought bread and wine that was to be used during the Mass. This was their gift to their Church family. They also brought other food to be blessed and sometimes this food was given to those who did not have enough to eat.

WE BRING OUR GIFTS: During this part of the Mass **we move from the ambo to the altar**. We have heard the Word of God and now we come to share in the Bread of Life at the altar. The first part of the

Liturgy of the Eucharist is about preparing the gifts that we bring to the altar. The **most important gifts that we bring are the bread and wine**. The bread is placed on something which looks like a plate. We call this a Paten. The wine is in a glass jug. These gifts are placed on the altar.

THE CENSUS IS TAKING PLACE ON SUNDAY, 3 APRIL.

Census Enumerators are calling to every home in the country to deliver census forms from now until census day. They will return after census night to collect your completed form. Enumerators can help you with any census queries that

you have, and there is more information at census.ie Census is carried out by the Central Statistics Office. The Enumerators wear yellow hi-viz jackets and carry an ID badge. It is very important that everyone is counted so we need householders to open their door to receive the form. A caller at the door can be unwelcome so I would appreciate your support to ensure the success of this important undertaking.

The census is a count, and account, of Ireland's population on Census Night (Sunday 3 April 2022). By law, everyone in the country on that night must be included on a census form. Census data gives vital information to help plan for homes, schools, hospitals, transport, age related services and many other services that are needed in our communities and country. One of the great strengths of the census is that it shows the number of people living in each region, county, town and local area in Ireland, and provides detailed population figures at each level. These help to identify the demand for services both locally and nationally. Census returns are treated as strictly private and used only for statistical purposes.





A WORD IN YOUR EAR...

More than 1m people died and over than 2m emigrated during the Irish famine. Up to recent days we had thought that such mass emigration was a 19th century phenomenon. How wrong we were!

According to the UN, more than 2 million Ukrainian civilians are now living as refugees. The west is facing another massive humanitarian crisis.

This war is seeping into every area of life. Many sporting bodies, including football's FIFA and the International Olympic Committee, responded with admirable speed to the war in Ukraine. Just one example is the volte face by the Paralympic Committee. That overnight about-turn prevented athletes from Russia and Belarus from participating in the Paralympic Games now underway in Beijing.



The nub of it all was contained in a very public social media exchange between Manchester City's Ukrainian player, Oleksandr Zinchenko and the Russian national team captain Artem Dzyuba. Whilst the Russian captain pleaded for politics to be kept out of sport, the Ukrainian international responded: "Everyone should be fighting evil, regardless of their occupation." A politician would be incapable of packing such a powerful punch!

This could be a very protracted conflict. The vulnerable are the first victims. The images of old people, women and children being carried across borders into neighbouring countries are shocking.



They compel us to examine our moral responsibility to those literally running for their lives. Most European nations have opened their doors to refugees. The manner, in which we welcome desperate people in desperate circumstances, reveals the very soul of who we are as individuals and nations. Ireland, along with the other EU member states, has brought forward temporary protection measures allowing Ukrainians to enter visafree, and to stay for up to three years. These measures deserve our full support.

Becoming a refugee doesn't define who you are as a person. It is something that happens to you. The writer Warsan Shire says in one of her poems, 'No-one leaves

home, unless home is the mouth of a shark.' You only run for the border when you see the whole city running as well. After the 2015 Syrian refugee crisis, the initial outpouring of sympathy and empathy turned into suspicion for some. The refugee can go quickly from being seen as a victim of political conflicts in need of protection, to threatening the present established order. War fatigue sets in, and so can refugee fatigue.

For the foreseeable future, Ukrainian refugees in particular will feature centrally in our political debates. Hospitality must be offered generously to these victims of a cruel, unjust war. After all, their battle is our battle. At its simplest level, hospitality is regarded as a virtue in most religious traditions. In the bible the story of Abraham, remains central. He acts as a host to three visitors,

feeding them and giving them shelter, unaware that they were angels. In desert cultures, offering food and water to strangers and travellers was like offering life itself. And in Islam, hospitality is regarded as the highest virtue, reflected in the Prophetic saying, 'There is no good in one who is not hospitable.'

If we see hospitality only as a watered down sentiment, we fail to recognise its far reaching potential for transforming societies. Hospitality helps to restore to people their dignity, not just refugees but ordinary people who may feel ignored. It has the power to turn hostilities into friendships, which are



mutually enriching, and which can allow all of us to become part of each other's stories.

"Then he used his walkietalkie to radio headquarters for reinforcements. They sent bombers to blow up the bridge and all the Israelites were saved."


"Now, Joey, is that REALLY what your teacher taught you?" his mother asked.

"Well, no. But if I said it how the teacher did, you'd never believe it!" ON THIS SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT, the church encourages us not to rest in the material comforts of this world. Rather, we should march towards the Promised Land and our future glory. If we succeed in getting there, the Lord in whom we put our trust and faith will transfigure our mortal bodies into the likeness of his glorified body.

In the Gospel, Jesus revealed his future glory to Peter, James and John who are collectively referred to by bible scholars as: "Members of the inner circle."

They saw the glory and splendour of God revealed in Christ who represents the New Covenant; in Moses, who represents the Law; and in Elijah who represents the Prophets. The Transfiguration of Christ before His disciples is of great significance and has lots of lessons for us.

The Lenten season offers us the opportunity to make sacrifices. It prepares us for the future glory through prayers, good works, reflections, and self denials. It is a time when we grow in grace in order to advance faithfully to the mountain of God's glory. In order to achieve this, Paul advised us to: "Remain faithful to our Lord Jesus Christ," because he is, "Our light and our help."

Ukrainian Greek-Catholic Church - Secretariat of the Head of the UGCC (Roma) 01.03.2022 SAM-Ce 22/16 Glory to Jesus Christ! Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ!

Greetings from the capital of free Ukraine, the first-throned City of Kyiv. Today we are experiencing the seventh day of war. On this day, 2 March 2022, at the call of the Holy Father, Pope Francis, the whole world unites in prayer and fasting for peace in Ukraine.



Today is a special day for all of us because we feel that in our misery we are not alone. However, the war continues. Last night they bombarded our Zhytomyr, they continued to shoot at our cities and villages. We are particularly worried about Kharkiv, Sumy, Chernihiv, Kherson, and other Ukrainian cities that are under siege, where today there is a great shortage of food and medicine. Today, abstaining from food, we stand in solidarity with them.

But today we unite in prayer. What does it mean to unite in prayer? In the last few days, we heard that only when we are united and unified, we will be strong and able to withstand this war. "In unity the strength of the people, God grant us unity", says a national hymn. But unity in prayer is something deeper. To unite in prayer means to exchange life. It means to share one's own life force with one's neighbour. To give one's own life force to one's neighbour, and thus to become stronger through the force of life that I receive with the one who unites in prayer.

In these days, we received so many letters from all over the world with the assurance that "we are with you" to unite in prayer and to unite in the name of peace, so that the life we live stand firm against death.

An example of such unity in prayer are the words of Christ to the Father, and "all things that are Mine are Yours, and Yours and Mine" [John 17:9–10]. Today we need so much that mutual strengthening, because this strength, this unity, is none other than the power and activity of the Holy Spirit.

Uniting in prayer, uniting in our inner spiritual life with the world, we become conscious of being sons and daughters of the one Church of Christ, the Body of Christ, whose Head is Christ Himself.


Today we pray and fast together. Fasting means breaking all that divides us, all that hinders me from sharing my life with others. That is why this fast is so important: to cast out the one who divides, the Devil, the spirit of war, the spirit of death.

I invite all of you today to a communal prayer service that will begin at 14:00 Kyiv time from Pokotylivka, near Kharkiv. Thereafter it will include Odesa, it will include our Drohobych, the famous Hrushiv, Zarvanytsia, our Hoshiv, our Univ, and will conclude here in Kyiv.

O God, receive our fasting and prayer! O God, unite us all! May life conquer death, and may the common prayer of the whole world bring peace to Ukraine. May the blessing of the Lord be upon you, through His grace and love for humankind, always, now and ever, and for ages of ages. Amen. Glory to Jesus Christ!
