Lenten Reflection - Practicing Generosity

Almsgiving has always been an important part of Lent. Lent began with the powerful readings from Isaiah 58, such as Isaiah 58:6-7, "Is not this the kind of fasting I have chosen:

to lose the chains of injustice and untie the cords of the yoke, to set the oppressed free — and break every yoke? Is it not to share your food with the hungry and to provide the poor wanderer with shelter— when you see the naked, to clothe them, and not to turn away from your own flesh and blood? on the Friday and Saturday after Ash Wednesday. It is important to give ourselves the experience of fasting from being un-generous.

Generosity is not simply giving my excess clothes to a place where poor people might purchase them. It's not even writing a "generous" check at the time a collection is taken up for a cause that benefits the poor. These are wonderful practices. **Generosity is an attitude**. It is a sense that no matter how much I have, <u>all that I have is gift</u>, <u>and given to me to be shared</u>. It means that sharing with others in need is one of my personal priorities. That is quite different from assessing all my needs first, and then giving away what is left over. A spirit of self-less giving means that one of my needs is to share what I have with others. Lent is a wonderful time to practice self-less giving because it takes practice. This kind of self-sacrificing generosity is a religious experience. It places us in solidarity with the poor who share with each other, without having any excess. It also joins us with Jesus, who gave himself completely, for us on Good Friday. Establishing new patterns of giving will give real life and joy to Lent.

CENTENARY COMMEMORATION 1923 LAND REGISTRY LAND OWNERS

When our hearts and thoughts turn to our ancestors, something inside us changes. We feel part of something greater than ourselves. Russell Neilson

One hundred years ago on 7th March 1923, seventeen local farmers from Glencorrib and Ballynalty became owners of the land they had previously rented. They began the process two years earlier on 19th March 1921 had their land finally registered on 7th March 1923.

On Sunday last 12th March 2023, we commemorated that final registration of an Indenture one hundred years ago which in effect transferred 591 acres, 2 roods and 31 perches of the Bunnafollistran estate to seventeen local farmers for the sum of £4,000.

We invited one person to represent each of the original seventeen land owners of 1923. Of these fifteen people represented the original seventeen. The other two names had no family descendents.

When the contract of sale was negotiated and signed off by the landlord at the time, General John Palmer Brabazon and the seventeen local farmers, it was during the troubled times of the War of Independence. But our local farmers battled on to make sure that the estate would be broken up and the land registered in their names.

When the contract was registered at the Registry of Deeds, in Dublin, they were in the middle of the Civil War. It has been said that the 17 holdings were originally drawn by lottery.

The purchasers were: Patrick (Tom) Flood, Patrick (Pat) Flood, Michael Flood, Thomas Mohan, Patrick Mohan, Thomas Donoghue, Edward Morrin, John (Sean) Murphy, Thomas Madden, Thomas Martyn, James Murphy, Norah Biggins, Patrick Moran, Michael Murphy, Patrick Hennelly, Patrick Maye and Michael O'Dea.

It's very important to commemorate and celebrate these major occasions in local history and to remember and honour the men and women who came before us.

A Word in your ear...

This week sees the tenth anniversary of the election of Pope Francis. The wide-ranging reforms he is making to the Catholic Church lead some to describe him as liberal or progressive. This is an over-simplification of the reality. The programme on which he was elected 10 years ago set forth in his first major policy statement, Evangelii Gaudium - is still intact. But he faces fierce resistance from some quarters inside the Catholic Church.

Francis is a very human pope, with many faults and failings. But disagreement and dialogue are a vital part of a living Church. There is an element among those opposing Francis who want to turn the Catholic Church



into some sort of pious otherworldly cult, frozen in time and disengaged from reality. Pope Francis is a traditional Catholic, but one who is interpreting the tradition in creative and inspiring ways. He weaves together ancient and modern sources of wisdom to inspire a vision of faith that seeks justice, peace and care for creation. His vision cries out against all forms of violence and oppression.

Ultimately, the agenda of the Francis papacy is the Gospel. The Second Vatican Council remains the touchstone for the expression of the teaching of the Church in the modern world, A similar vision led the prophet Isaiah to write nearly three thousand years ago of a world in which:

"They shall beat their swords into ploughshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more."

The idea of 'progress' is difficult to pin down. It is sometimes based on an optimistic view of history. This view suggests that, however many failures there may be along the way, improvement through time is inevitable. Such thinking is based on problematic assumptions about the superiority of western society. Because this is the benchmark against which other cultures and values are measured and often found backward or wanting. There has been progress for sure in our scientific understanding of nature and our technological abilities. But these have trailed in their wake devastating environmental damage, and ingenious new ways of waging war and killing others.

Pope Francis uses the term 'the technocratic paradigm' to describe western culture's obsession with technological fixes to every problem. The challenges facing mankind today are the same as those faced by our ancestors. War, poverty, pandemics, exile, floods and earthquakes - these afflictions have always been with us, and for all our science and technology, they continue to blight the human condition. To say that it need not be like this is neither progressive nor liberal, for it expresses a yearning that is written into the stories of people since the beginning of history.

Life itself is not progressive. I have now passed the biblical benchmark of three score and ten years. I hope I'm a little wiser than I was when I was thirty. But ageing brings its own problems. Many of us are living longer, thanks to medical science, but that makes us more vulnerable to some of the more debilitating aspects of the ageing process. At 86, Pope Francis experiences limited mobility and often uses a wheelchair as he continues to shape his reforming vision - a vision that draws on the riches of the past to offer inspiration to the present and hope for the future. 
